In order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress of the 5th of June, 1852,

**STATE OF MAINE,** {  
**HARRISBURG COUNTY,**

On this Eleventh day of January, A. D. 1881, I personally appeared before me ~~William Ward~~<sup>as a justice of the peace for said County in said</sup> State, Solomon Fletcher, a resident of Waterville, in the County of Kennebec and State of Maine, aged seventy-eight years, who being first duly sworn, according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress, passed June 7, 1862. That he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year 1865 with Captain Joshua Long and served in Col. ~~first reccealed~~<sup>first</sup> regiment of the Massachusetts Line of Troops under the following named officers: Gray, Pugh

- the Massachusetts Line or Corps under the following named officers, etc., etc., etc.

  1. That he enlisted in that company as a private about the 15<sup>th</sup> July 1775, for six months, and served therein until the last of December of the same year when he was honorably but verbally discharged.
  2. That the last of December 1775 he enlisted as a private in Capt. Morris's company in Col. French's regiment, for the time commanded by Col. Tupper, for the same term, for the period of one year, that this period having so well served out, the last of December 1776 was discharged and released.
  3. That in 1777 he served six months as a private in Capt. Clark's company in Col. Beekman's regiment, and was verbally discharged at Poughkeepsie.
  4. That in 1777 he served as a drummer three months in Capt. the Honorable Donisthorpe's light Battalion.
  5. That about the first of April 1778 he enlisted as a private for two months in Capt. Newell's company in Col. Jonathan Read's regiment; that this period he fully served out and was verbally discharged at Albany in July 1778.
  6. That in 1778 he served six months as a private in Capt. Clark's company in the Honorable Col. Langstaff's regiment, and was verbally discharged in June 1779, at Albany, Massachusetts.
  7. That in May 1779 he enlisted for a month and another of time as a drummer in Capt. French's regiment, commanded by Gen. Hale, for the serving three months and verbally discharged.
  8. That in October 1779 he did duty several days as a private in a company of 12 months at Albany, in Capt. Elizur Ward's company, commanded by Capt. Ward, and was then verbally discharged.

(That he was placed with team all the rest of the month of November 1779, at Albany, in Capt. French's regiment, commanded by Capt. Tupper, and was honorably discharged.)

And to the interrogatories propounded under the instructions of the war department, he answered:

That he was born in the year 1754 at Plymouth Massachusetts where he remained  
his age is recorded. Where his home was during his revolutionary service  
that he afterwards removed to New Haven which he has ever since resided.  
That during his first service he was employed in guarding the shores of  
New Plymouth. That during his third service he was stationed on Harbor  
one of the Elizabeth Islands. During his fifth service he was guarding troops  
posted at the Captain of Provincetown. That during his eighth service he was  
guarding the shores of New Bedford Mass. That any of his neighbors  
will testify to his character for veracity & their belief of his services.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or an annuity, except the present, and he declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of any agency in any State.
